Overview: In 2024, the United States exported over \$9 million of pulses, to Japan, making Japan the #21 overseas market. The United States accounted for seven percent of Japan's total imports of pulses. The years below correspond to Japan's fiscal year beginning April 1.

Market Considerations: Japan maintains a tariff-rate quota under the World Trade Organization (WTO) for dried leguminous vegetables including adzuki, kidney beans, peas, and other pulses. The United States is the fourth largest supplier of pulses to Japan after China, Canada, and Burma. About 60 percent of beans in Japan are used for sweet bean paste primarily as a filling for traditional desserts and pastries. While demand for bean paste has been stagnant, non-traditional use of pulses, such as chickpeas and lentils, in salads, soups and hummus is on the rise.
